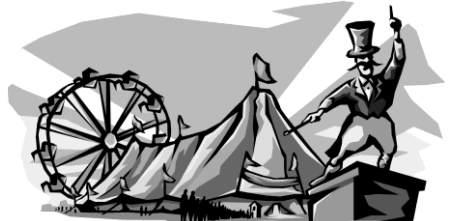
As always, your fair book offers all of the various categories for participation, and we have the registration papers on-line at parhamfair.ca which can be printed, for your convenience.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

GENERAL

1. An annual membership of \$10.00 shall constitute a 2011 membership, if paid before 9 pm, August 25 to the Treasurer. **A JUNIOR membership is free** to children under 12 and entitle the Junior member to exhibit in classes U & V only.

2. Only members who have paid their memberships are entitled to compete.

3. **IMPORTANT** – Entry forms can be mailed to the Secretary at the following address: Box 38, Parham, ON K0H 2K0. All entry forms shall be left with the Secretary on or before Thursday, August 25, at 9:00 pm.

4. The sum of \$10.00 will be retained from each exhibitor winning prize money for the following year's membership fees. Each exhibitor winning prize money will be charged 15% of the amount won to help cover grounds expenses. The 15% of the amount won does not apply to special prizes, class C, U, & V.

5. In case of not being sufficient money in the treasury to meet all demands, prizes will be paid at whatever percentage the funds will allow.

6. Parties exhibiting goods not owned by them shall forfeit all prize money.

7. No person shall act as a judge in any class in which he/she is an exhibitor.

8. No person shall be allowed to interfere with the judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors interfering will forfeit their right of any premium to which they may be otherwise entitled.

9. The Judges are requested to use proper tickets on their rewards and not to place a "First Prize" ticket on an animal or article entered as "extra" or "special".

10. All entries must be made on proper forms which accompany the Prize List, or furnished by the Secretary, on application. Please make entries early. **All exhibits must be at the Exhibit Palace by 9 pm Thursday Night.** The Society has decreed that all Palace Exhibits shall be brought in on Thursday night allowing the Judges Friday morning to Judge and the Exhibit Palace to be open all evening Friday and all day Saturday and Sunday.

11. In the absence of competition in any section, or if stock or other articles exhibited are of inferior quality, the Judges are instructed to award only such premium as they think the article deserves. They will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award the First, Second or any premium.

12. No prize money will be paid until at least three weeks after the Fair so the Directors may have time to investigate and settle any dispute which may arise and finally sanction the awards. A Directors Meeting will be held in September to sanction or amend Judge's awards. **PLEASE NOTE: Prizes or cheques not cashed by December 15, 2011 will be placed to the credit of the Society.**

13. A Society Membership Card will entitle the card holder admission to the show grounds. The exhibitor must show the membership card when entering the grounds. Membership cards are non-transferable. All other tickets will be rated as follows:

Children 12 and under are free all weekend.

14. While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to ensure safety of articles sent to the Fair, they wish to be understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them, should any articles be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment thereof.

15. All complaints regarding illegal entries etc. to be sent to the Secretary in writing within one week of the fair date, with a fee of \$5.00. Said fee to be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.

16. **No Exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any section of any Class of this Prize List** – except in Children's Work or Livestock.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

17. All parties exhibiting in Specials must be members of the Parham Agricultural Society with the exception of Sports in which any person may compete.

18. Any Exhibitor will be allowed to placard any exhibit after awards have been made by the Judge.

19. The board of a society may pass by-laws (a) prohibiting any theatrical, circus or acrobatic performance; and (b) regulating the sale of goods and produce, on exhibit grounds operated by the society or within 275 meters thereof on the day of an exhibition organized by the society. Agricultural and Horticultural Organizations Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.A.9,s.31.

EXHIBIT HALL (The Palace)

20. All clothes and manufactured goods to be manufactured and owned by the exhibitor.

21. All bags with grain or other articles must be without a mark.

22. A ticket or tag must be attached to each and every article put on exhibition with class number, class description, exhibitor number and name. Any hall exhibits not having entry tags on will not be judged.

23. Fruits, vegetables and dairy products must be raised or made by the exhibitor during the present year. Grains must be entered or raised in 2010-2011 and grown by the exhibitor. The year must be stated.

24. All entries winning prizes in Class R, S & T must not be exhibited more than two years at this fair.

25. All entries exhibited in the Hall to be placed by the Chairman of the sections pertaining to the entries.

26. Entries must be brought between 6:00-9:00 pm Thursday, and removed between 5:00-7:00 pm Sunday.

LIVESTOCK

27. All stock to be properly secured and not allowed to run at large.

28. As the object of the Society in giving prizes on livestock is to promote improvements in breeding stock, the judges, in making awards will be instructed not to take into consideration the present value of the butcher of the animal exhibited, but to decide according to their relative merit for the purpose of breeding.

29. Officers and Directors are requested to remove their badges while exhibiting stock.

30. No animal, unless having one pure cross from purebred pedigree, can be entered as a grade.

31. Registration papers for all "Purebred Stock" must accompany Exhibitor and be produced on request by the Judge.

32. Directors request all stock awarded a prize to form a parade in front of the Grand Stand with the prize ribbon.

33. Proof of Liability Insurance on all animals must be shown.

DEMO DERBY – Rules & Regulations

APPLIES TO 1980 & NEWER BIG & MINI CARS.

6 CYLINDER CARS WITH LESS THAN 106" WHEEL BASE WILL RUN WITH 4 CYLINDER CARS. FLAGMEN WILL MEASURE AND CLEAR THE CAR FOR THE DERBY. NO JEEPS, LIMOS, VANS, CONVERTIBLES OR CHECKER CABS. TRUCKS MUST BE ½ OR ¾ TON. NO 4X4'S OR 1 TON. ALLOWED.

- 1) All Glass, including headlights, mirrors, w indshields etc. must be removed before being brought to the derby.
- 2) Stock Gas Tanks must be removed. Use a Steel Marine Tank or Custom Steel Tank, No Plastic Tanks. Tanks must be secured and fastened down in the middle of the back seat area and covered with a fire shield. Max of 3 gallons of gas.
- 3) Cars w ith Electric Fuel pumps must have a safety shut off switch mounted on top of the steering column of dash for easy access for DRIVERS & FLAGMEN. All fuel lines must have leak proof fittings w ith rubber or steel lines. Lines should run inside of car.
- 4) No Special Bumpers or Reinforcements are allow ed. 1970's Bumpers CAN NOT be used on 1980's cars. Only Car Bumpers on Cars (NO TRUCK BUMPERS). 6-8 Cylinder Bumpers on 6-8 Cylinder Cars, 4 Cylinder Bumpers on 4 Cylinder Cars.
- 5) All Trailer Hitches must be removed and rough edges pounded down prior to derby.
- 6) 12 Volt Car Battery must be moved to the front passenger floor and placed in a container aw ay from the Gas Tank and must be Secured and Fastened down and covered w ith a shield.
- 7) Roll Bars can be used if desired.
- 8) Drivers must drive forward and backward. There w ill be NO DELIBERATE HITTING ON THE DRIVER'S DOOR, OR DRIVER TRYING TO PULL HIS DOOR, THIS COULD RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION. (DECISION OF THE FLAG CREW).
- 9) All Doors must be w elded or w ired shut, including station w agon tailgates.
- 10) Cutting fender and body for w heel clearance is allow ed.
- 11) Drivers must not leave their cars unless told to do so by a track official and then only w hen flag is raised.
- 12) In case of FIRE or ROLL-OVER, stay clear of the ring and off the track. A car that rolls is disqualified from the heat, but upon re-inspection by the flag-crew and Okayed for safety may go into hard luck if there is one. This could vary depending on the derby (DECISION OF THE FLAG CREW).
- 13) No spring jacks or blocked shocks allow ed, Suspension must remain stock (MUST HAVE MOVEMENT).
- 14) Hood and Trunk lids must be operable; they must be w ired but not w elded.
- 15) ALL CARS & TRUCKS must have w orking brakes at all times.
- 16) There must be at least a 12" hole in hood above the carburetor in case of fire.
- 17) Radiator must be flushed of Anti-Freeze and replaced w ith water only.
- 18) All air bags and air sensors must be removed.
- 19) All flammable material except the drivers east and dash board must be removed.
- 20) MASIMUM 16" D.O.T. TIRES. NO FORKLIFT TIRES. All tires must be filled w ith air only. NO SNOW TIRES.
- 21) All w heel weights must be removed.
- 22) DRIVER'S DOOR ONLY TO BE PAINTED WHITE, w ith car number IN BIG LETTERS as w ell as on the Passengers Door and Roof. NO ALL WHITE CARS.
- 23) On the outside of the driver's door there may be a thin steel plate bolted in 4 locations, mas ½" through bolt and spot w elded, no angle iron or c channel.
- 24) No dash bars across the dash.
- 25) Over repaired frames could be considered reinforced and result in disqualification or adjustment. Officials Decision. Drivers may be asked to cut over repaired areas.

DEMO DERBY – Rules & Regulations

- 26) All Cars and Trucks must have a working C.S.A. Fire Extinguisher with working gage in Vehicle near Driver.
- 27) All Cars and Trucks must have working Seat Belt, also Helmet with Shield or Safety Glasses, Gin Strap in Place and Done Up.
- 28) Safety Helmet to be kept on, until the heat is completed. (Absolutely no removal during heat)
- 29) Driver's to have on long pants and shirt or coveralls. Closed in shoes or boots, no sandals.
- 30) If one Car Deliberately pushes another car over the Rails or Cement Blocks. THIS WILL BE A FINAL DECISION CALL OF THE TRACK OFFICIALS.
- 31) If a car Rolls over in Heat, it will be disqualified, following heat upon inspection to check if it is safe and within safety standards, may be allowed to go into the Hard Luck Heat if there is one. Final Decision Call by Track Officials.
- 32) Cars must be removed from the grounds immediately following the derby or they will become the property of the Derby Committee or Fair Board.
- 33) Demolition Derby's can be very dangerous. If you have any serious health problems you should not compete. (Including Pregnancy - ABSOLUTELY NO)
- 34) All Drivers MUST ATTEND DRIVERS MEETING and ask any questions when in doubt.
- 35) NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES OR NARCOTICS ALLOWED IN THE PIT AREA. Anyone found to be under the influence of either will be DISQUALIFIED and asked to leave the ground immediately. THIS PERTAINS TO THE DRIVERS, PIT CREW, TOW OPERATORS, FANS, MECHANICS, ETC.
- 36) Additional Safety Rules & Regulations may be Forth Coming Depending on Weather and Ring Conditions.
- 37) HEAT WINNER OR HARD LUCK WINNERS MUST be the SAME DRIVER & SAME CAR that goes to the Feature (ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS).
- 38) Only the Driver and one mechanic are allowed in the PIT area with your entry fee.
- 39) ALL PIT PASSES MUST BE VISIBLE AT ALL TIMES. NO ONE UNDER THE AGE OF 16 IS ALLOWED IN THE PIT AREA. All people with PIT PASSES must have signed a RELEASE form at the PIT AREA GATE when buying a PASS. If you do not have a pass you will be escorted from the PIT AREA IMMEDIATELY.
- 40) Only 1 tow vehicle per car entry allowed in the pit area.
- 41) DRIVERS must be at least 18 years of age with a VALID Driver's License. (If a beginners license you must have a notarized release signed by a parent or guardian).
- 42) Each Driver must fill out a Entry Form. Enter early and SAVE LATE FEES.
- 43) There will be Absolutely NO REFUNDS OF ENTRY MONEY for any reason. This includes Disqualifications.
